Alumni Dvar Torah:

The Dialectic of the Dwellings: Finding Sukkot on Campus

When we look back at our college years, most of us remember a dual experience: the intense, invigorating vulnerability of being pushed intellectually, and the essential need for a community that kept us grounded.

That exact tension sits at the heart of Sukkot. In Tractate Sukkah 11b, the Talmud records a classic debate over what the Israelites actually lived in during their wilderness journey. Rabbi Akiva posits that they dwelt in sukkot mamash—literal, physical huts built from fragile branches. Rabbi Eliezer, however, argues that the booths were transcendent: the Ananei HaKavod, the miraculous Clouds of Glory that enveloped and protected the camp.

For UChicago alumni, this rabbinic debate feels surprisingly familiar.

Rabbi Akiva's physical hut represents the concrete, exposed reality of the undergraduate experience. It is the vulnerability of wrestling with foundational texts, the long hours in library carrels, the gauntlet of the Common Core, and the quiet beauty of the Gothic quads. Like a physical sukkah open to the elements, those years were a temporary scaffolding—our first unmediated encounter with rigorous independent thought and independent adulthood.

Rabbi Eliezer's Cloud of Glory, by contrast, is the protective canopy that sustained us through the pressure. Amidst intense analytical demands, Hillel



served as a sanctuary—a sheltering environment of intellectual inquiry, Shabbat warmth, and enduring solidarity that anchored our identities.

Sukkot reminds us that human growth requires both the hut and the cloud. The exposure of the academic hut compels us to cultivate intellectual resilience, while the sheltering cloud of community provides the safety and warmth needed to truly thrive.

Decades after leaving campus, alumni carry the synthesis of both into the world. We deploy the critical frameworks forged in the classroom alongside the spiritual and communal values nurtured at Hillel. This Sukkot, let us honor the lessons of the physical hut, express gratitude for the protective clouds that sustained us, and reaffirm our connection to the global community of minds and hearts that unites us still.

Dr. Goldberg is renowned expert in reading and literacy, he is the author of MaDYK, the only second-language Hebrew dynamic assessment used globally to monitor Hebrew literacy development. He also authored Even Kriah, the first evidence-based Hebrew reading program grounded in the Science of Reading. Dr. Scott Goldberg is the Golda Koschitzky Chair in Jewish Education at Yeshiva University's Azrieli Graduate School. Dr. Goldberg holds a Ph.D. in Applied Psychology from NYU, an M.S.Ed. in Special Education from Bank Street College, and a B.A. in Jewish Studies from the University of Chicago.

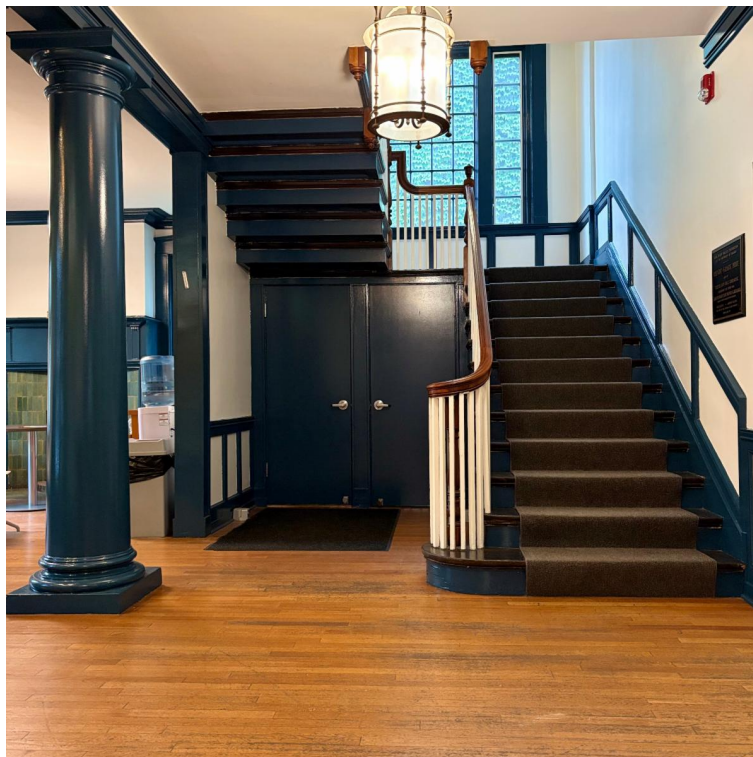


Since we last spoke...
